Director's Notes

When asked what all of the "good playwrights" had in common, the great Arthur Miller (certainly a member of that group) said:

"They are all burning with some anger at the way the world is."

The mid 19th century realists and the naturalists that followed them felt they had a duty to expose the ills and evils of the world so that those who sat in the theatres would become angry enough to go out and do something about it.

In 2020, seemingly all of a sudden, the pandemic forced us to realize that doing theatre was a privilege; it was not guaranteed that we would be allowed to perform for you this fall. We reasoned that if we have this chance, we'd better make it count. So, with the 19th century realists in mind, we found something quite new, and quite important. Written in 2019 by Kimberly Belflower, *John Proctor Is The Villain* turns the patriarchal worldview of *The Crucible*'s stoic hero upside down. It challenges the belief that Proctor was ever anything more than a man who cheated on his spouse with - for all intents and purposes - a child, and then lashed out at his wife for having the audacity not to trust him.

A "feel-good musical", this ain't.

But it's a story worth telling, because it's a perception worth examining, and a privilege worth dismantling. Like the audiences who first watched the great naturalist drama *A Doll's House*, we hope you leave tonight feeling a little uncomfortable, because like Nora said in Ibsen's masterwork:

"I can't be satisfied any longer with what most people say... I must think things out for myself."
